



Odaline de la Martinez's 6th London Festival of American Music champions female composers' music in the majority of the 19 premieres

Cuban conductor and composer Odaline de la Martinez announces the programme for the 6th London Festival of American Music, with a focus on female composers and performers. The Festival will showcase works by both male and female composers, with an unusually high percentage of works by the latter (50%). Martinez has also programmed a significant number of premieres - 19 UK premieres and 7 world premieres - throughout the festival. Martinez initiated the festival ten years ago and it has since become a biennial fixture to celebrate contemporary American music in the

UK. The aim of the festival is to promote the work of outstanding American composers, well established in the States but less known to UK audiences.

Martinez comments: "This year, even more than previous years, American female composers take centre stage alongside their male counterparts. We have young newly-emerging composers such as Julia Howell alongside established ones such as Augusta Read Thomas and Jennifer Higdon."

In 1984, musical pioneer Odaline de la Martinez became the first woman to conduct at the BBC Proms. 2016 marks the 40th anniversary of her ensemble





Lontano, which was founded in 1976 to champion new music - they have commissioned, premiered and recorded hundreds of new works.

The 2016 Festival begins with a film viewing of Selected Scenes from Part I of Martinez's Slavery Opera Trilogy - *Imoinda*. The film was created following Martinez's success winning Opera America's Opera Grant for Female Composers in 2015. Martinez was one of seven winners of the 2015 Female Composers Discovery Grant, which is funded by the Virginia B. Toulmin Foundation. The Trilogy is the first Afro-Cuban opera on slavery and uses a libretto by Joan Anim-Addo who will speak about the opera during the viewing. *Imoinda* - was commissioned by the Caribbean Women Writers' Alliance (CWWA) with funds from the Heritage Lottery Fund, England. Part II of the Trilogy - *The Crossing* - was performed at the 2014 London Festival of American Music and Martinez aims to perform the whole Trilogy at the 7th Festival in 2018.

The New London Chamber Choir, Lontano, and American viola soloist Stephen Upshaw will perform the first concert of the Festival, conducted by Martinez. The programme consists of music by the late American composer Earle Brown, including, Tracking Pierrot and two interpretations of his *New Piece*. The programme also includes Morton Feldman's *Rothko Chapel* to mark the 90th anniversary of the composer's birth.

On 8 November, the Fidelio Trio - Darragh Morgan, Adi Tal and Mary Dulleaperform several premieres, including the world premiere of Annie Gosfield's *Cranks and Cactus needles* and the UK premiere of Jennifer Higdon's *Pale Yellow*.

The third concert of the Festival features further premieres by John Harbison, Hannah Lash, Charles Shadle and Peter Child. Martinez has collaborated with Peter Child numerous times before and his works were featured in the 2014 Festival. Charles Shadle and John Harbison also had premieres in the last Festival, including the world premiere of Shadle's *Red Cedar*. Hannah Lash will be guest harpist in the UK premiere of her work *Three Shades Without Angles*.

Prior to this concert a panel of visiting women composers will be led by leading journalist of women in music.

Acclaimed British soprano Nadine Benjamin returns to the Festival to perform a programme of songs by female composers with pianist Susanna Stranders. Benjamin starred in Martinez's *The Crossing* in the 2014 festival alongside tenor John-Colyn Gyeanty. Odaline de la Martinez will take part in a free preconcert *Meet the Composer* session to talk about all the composers being performed in the programme.

Odaline de la Martinez conducts her Lontano ensemble for the final concert of the Festival, in a programme entirely made up of UK and world premieres. The ensemble will be performing works by female composers Jennifer Higdon,





Augusta Read Thomas, Julia Howell, Laura Kaminsky and Barbara Jazwinski in addition to work by Carlos R. Carrillo and Fred Lerdahl. This concert also marks the 40th anniversary of Lontano.

Born in Cuba and raised in the United States, composer and conductor Odaline de la Martinez is one of the Britain's most dynamic and gifted musicians. Through the years she has established an international reputation as one of the most exciting and versatile pioneers of 20th and 21st century music. In 1984 Martinez became the first woman in history to conduct a BBC Promenade Concert at the Royal Albert Hall, and 1987 she was awarded the Villa Lobos medal from the Brazilian government in recognition

of her outstanding work promoting and conducting his music. Martinez was made a fellow of the Royal Academy of Music in 1990, and to this day she is





in demand throughout the world both as an orchestra and opera conductor, and with her ensemble Lontano. Her conducting repertoire ranges from Mozart symphonies to the latest contemporary music.

Martinez attended Tulane University, New Orleans. She founded Lontano in 1976 whilst studying composition at the Royal Academy of Music, and the ensemble's impact on the perception of new music has been profound and enduring. With Lontano she commissions, produces, performs and records with the primary aim of bringing to the fore the work of living contemporary composers, female composers from all periods, and Latin American classical music. The ensemble's sphere of activity includes contemporary opera, music theatre, concerts, workshops, education projects, tours, broadcasts and recordings.

Always at the front of music innovation, Martinez' ensemble was one of the first ensembles to form its own record company when in 1992 it established the LORELT label. Now with a catalogue of 39 recordings, LORELT features soloists as well as other ensembles and is noted for its archive of important and often neglected compositions. Odaline de la Martinez is also trustee of The Mornington Trust, who together with **Lontano** has been responsible community and educational work in Waltham Forest and other London boroughs since 2000. Presently the charity is involved in an eight-year project working with Roma, Gypsy and Traveller communities in the East of London.

Lontano's impact on the perception of new music has been profound and enduring. Since its inception in 1976 by conductor/composer Odaline de la Martinez and flautist Ingrid Culliford, Lontano has established an international reputation as one of the most exciting and versatile exponents of 20th and 21st century music.





Lontano commissions, produces, performs and records with the primary aim of brining to the fore the work of contemporary British and American composers, Women composers and Latin American classical repertoire. The ensemble's sphere of activity includes contemporary opera, music theatre, concerts, workshops, education projects, tours, broadcasts and recordings. Performances feature some of the most noted, inventive and radical names in contemporary composition including Judith Weir, Martin Butler, Roberto Sierra, Errollyn Wallen, Nicola le Fanu,

Peter Sculthorpe, Sir Harrison Birtwistle, Chen Yi, Lindsay Cooper, John Harbison and Steve Reich.

Lontano's global allure has resulted in performances as far a field as Istanbul (residency, Turkish-British Women Composers Week), Zagreb (performance of Jenni Riditi's opera *Inanna*, at the Zargreb Biennale Festival), USA, Canada, Mexico, South and Central America. Activities include performances at the Huddersfield and Cheltenham International Festivals, Chard Festival of Women in Music, the Bath Festival, the BBC Proms, the premiere of Paul Barker's opera *Stone Angels* at the Bloomsbury Theatre, the enormously successful Émigrés Series on London's Southbank and the premier of Jenni Roditi's opera *Spirit Child*.

Lontano gave a very successful residency at MIT - the Massachusetts Institute of Technology - as part of MIT's 150th Anniversary celebrations. *Dream-Hunter*, a newly commissioned opera by Nicola LeFanu was premiered in the autumn of 2011 with a Welsh tour supported by a grant from the Arts Council Wales as well as three London performances at Wilton's Music Hall in February 2012. Lontano's 4th London Festival of American Music took place in October of 2012 and featured the UK Premiere of John Harbison's chamber opera *Full Moon in March*. 2013 saw Lontano participating in several UK Festivals as well CD recordings for Lorelt. The 5th London Festival of American Music, that took place in November 2014 featured the UK Premiere of Odaline de la Martinez's opera *The Crossing*, Eclectic Voices, Nadine Benjamin and John Coleyn Geyantey soloists, conductor Scott Stroman.

In March 2015 Lontano undertook a tour of Northeast USA with residencies at Massachusetts Institute of Technology and at State University of New York at Binghamton. Later that year Lontano recorded Dame Ethel Smyth's 4th opera *Boatswain's Mate* to be released by Retrospect Opera this summer.
